New Dues Procedures Instituted

During the Fall Executive Board, and in the last issue of the *Alpha Sigma News*, chapter treasurers were informed of the new dues collection dates. The deadline has always been October 31 however, that date has now changed.

Last year, DKG International underwent an audit. Society Head-quarters informed the state treasurers about the auditors' con-

cerns. They [auditors] asked, "How can your organization function without your money for half a year?"

Our DKG organization's fiscal year runs from July 1 - June 30. Though membership dues were collected in October, International did not receive the monies until

November or December. This was, indeed, a situation that warranted closer examination.

As a result, at the 2018 International Convention in Austin, members voted to approve changing the membership dues due date. The change? 2019-2020 membership dues are now due by JUNE 30, 2019. By making the change, all levels of the organization get their operating money up front, at the beginning of the fiscal year.

Your chapter treasurer has been informed and she should <u>begin collecting your dues in May</u>. For those members who tend to procrastinate, International is taking over the process of dropping non-dues paying members. Your treasurer no longer needs to feel guilty about it.

So please do your chapter treasurer a favor and honor this new timeline.

Membership Dues Reminder

Oh my gosh! Is it really time to start paying next year's dues already? It sure is! As you probably know, at last summer's International Convention, it was passed to have dues paid by the start of the new fiscal year rather than waiting until

October. As a chapter, how can you help your members with what may be a difficult time financially? Here are some ideas:

- Allow your members to pay monthly or in installments. (Please check this out with your chapter treasurer first. It will put added work on them.)
- Have a fundraiser. Use that money to help offset the amount of dues members need to pay. (Check out www.dkg.org. Type fundraising ideas in Keyword Search Box.)
- Have a drawing. Anyone who has paid their dues by a set date will have their name put into the drawing.

 Draw one name. (Maybe more if your chapter can afford it.) That person will have the chapter pay their dues for them.
- Set up a dues assistance fund. Members sometimes round up the amount of their check when paying dues. Use that added money to help other members. If someone is having financial difficulty, use that money to pay her dues or a portion. (Be sure to be discreet.)

This may be the rough year for some. It feels like we're paying twice this year, but it is really for two different years.



Treasurers: When a member passes away, please remember to send in a Form 6 (report of the death of a member) as soon as possible. The

form may be found on the International websitewww.dkg.org under Forms/Membership.

Also, whenever you have a new initiate, please submit Form 81, Initiation Form to the State Treasurer along with the state and international portion of the initiate's dues.

Did you know that there are several dozen women in Canada and the U.S. that are thousands of miles from their homes and families? These women are from many other countries, some third world countries, or countries with little educational opportunity for women. They are sacrificing so much to come to this country for an advanced degree so they can follow their dream and make a difference in this world. Many of these women would love to have a post card, a birthday card, a word of encouragement, or a phone conversation if you live nearby. YOU and YOUR CHAPTER could take twenty minutes at a chapter meeting to complete a card and send to one of these women—or a card/email to each of them. (You may have a WF recipient near your

World Fellowship is the DKG fellowship grant that is supported by our society since 1960. We have supported over 920 women from 120 countries and given over \$3,349,100 in grants. We work with the Fulbright organization to select these women and then our members provide emotional support through their work in Canada and the U.S. Also, any fund raising or donations you, your estate, or your chapter could do would be wonderful. DKG Member Life Experiences Benefit New Educators

Think back to when you were a new teacher. The excitement of getting your own classroom, the engaging lessons you had prepared, your classroom walls decorated in warmth and an array of color that encouraged your students to want to learn. The first day of school arrives. You are face-to-face with your first class. If you were an elementary teacher, you remember being with your students all day. If you were a middle or high school teacher, first period greets you with 34 news faces. By the end of the day you have met over 150 students. You wonder how you will ever remember all their names.

The first week flies by without any major catastrophe. Week two, the honeymoon is over. Your students start testing you, possibly arguing with you. You begin to feel overwhelmed. Too many students, too many papers, not enough time to get everything done. You are exhausted and begin to question your career choice.

Are your memories coming back? We have all been there. Now, there is a new generation of teachers who are experiencing the challenges and successes of the first year of teaching. The stresses of first year teaching can become daunting and overwhelming. DKG members have the personal experience to guide new educators. Mentoring new teachers as they navigate and discover their individual style is one way DKG members can encourage those who are new to the amazing art of teaching.

A mentor provides a listening ear, a sounding board, a greater perspective, and a support system to aid the new teacher. The mentor can be the light at the end of an incredible difficult day.

Many school districts in Washington State mandate new teachers participate in a mentor relationship with an experienced teacher within the district they work in. This relationship typically lasts one year. However, a more personal DKG sisterhood approach to mentoring can begin a lifetime support network that started humbly between two people. You may not know all the ins and outs of TPEP or the curriculum being taught, but you do know what it takes to survive those first years in teaching. You know how to correct papers and set up for a class activity. You know how to be a supportive friend. Washington State's new teachers need our support and experience to help them navigate a career that provides a lifetime of occasional heartache and overwhelming joyfulness all wrapped up in one.

Contact the school nearest you. Find out who the new teachers are. Send an encouraging note and begin the mentoring relationship. The power of community support can't be enphasized enough. Be the positive, supportive community member who has traveled the teaching journey they are beginning. Let her know she does not have to walk the road alone. Let her know Delta Kappa Gamma is supporting her every step of the way.

Proposed Bylaw Amendments

The Executive Committee recommends approval of all of the proposed amendments presented.

BYLAWS ARTICLE IV Finances Section C Payment of Dues and Fees

Finance Committee

Beginning Line 118 3. For membership commencing on or after January 1 until June 30, the member shall pay one-half of the international and state membership dues. Each chapter will determine if their chapter dues will be adjusted.

Rationale: To further encourage key women educators to join DKG throughout the fiscal year.

Fiscal Impact: Washington State Organization (WSO) and International will each receive some dues payment and some members will benefit from reduced membership rates for up to six months.

BYLAWS ARTICLE VIII Committees Section B

Executive Committee

Beginning line #505 1.Communication and Marketing

a. The committee shall include a committee chair with expertise in communication, the state editor of the Alpha Sigma News and the state webmaster, all of whom will serve as co-chairs of the committee and shall receive reimbursement commensurate with chairs as stated in Bylaws Article VIII Committees, Section A 5i.

Rationale: By changing the editor and webmaster to a co-chair committee position, their duties & travel reimbursement will be commensurate with all other state committee chairs.

Fiscal Impact: None (Standing Rules 3.65 1a states they will be reimbursed the same as committee chairs)

**Article VIII Committees Section B 2e

Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee

Beginning Line 542: Changes in the Washington State Organization's Bylaws and Standing Rules necessitated by amendments to the DKG Constitution and/or International Standing Rules shall be made by the state Bylaws and Standing Rules committee, shared with the Executive Committee, and then reported to our membership via email and on the WSO website within two months after the revised International documents are made available. In following this format, the state organization (Executive Board) will not need to approve each change individually.

Rationale: This amendment would allow Washington State Organization (WSO) to automatically update our *Bylaws* and *Standing Rules* to bring them into conformity with the DKG *Constitution* and *International Standing Rules* AND eliminate the time consuming and tedious process of presenting and voting on the mandated changes.

Fiscal Impact: None

Article VIII Committees Section B 2 f

Bylaws and Standing Rules Committee

Line 543 Once each biennium, chapter rules shall be reviewed for consistency with international and state governing documents. Revisions necessitated by amendments to the DKG Constitution and/or International Standing Rules may be made to Chapter Rules by the chapter's Bylaws and Standing Rules committee and then shared with chapter members via electronic means. Brief discussion and/or clarifications will be provided at the next chapter business meeting and a consent vote taken. A digital copy of the updated chapter rules will then be sent to the State Bylaws chair.

Rationale: This amendment will allow chapters to automatically update their Chapter Rules to bring them into conformity with the DKG *Constitution* and *International Standing Rules* AND eliminate the time consuming and tedious process of presenting and voting on the mandated changes.

Fiscal Impact: None

ARTICLE XI Publications

Communications Committee

Line 764 Beginning in fall 2019, The Alpha Sigma News will be published four (4) times a year in electronic form only. Chapters will be responsible for distributing the state newsletter to those members without email addresses in a manner determined by the chapter. The state shall publish a news periodical, The Alpha Sigma State News, three (3) times a year in print and electronic form. Starting in 2015, the state will e-mail an electronic newsletter with the print copy mailed to those without electronic access.

Rationale: Less than 75 (8.5%) of state members are without email addresses listed on the state DKG roster, a number which is declining annually. Because of the low numbers, the state is now required to send print copies via first class mail. Washington State DKG currently spends approximately \$1,000 per year to mail out the ASN at first class mail rates.

International and most states now have moved to "electronic only" formats for newsletter distribution, primarily as a cost saving device, but also to appeal to current member preferences. In most states using electronic only distribution, chapters determine the best way to distribute the newsletters to members without email. Some copy and mail them; others copy the newsletter and take it in person to shut-in members.

This change in the frequency of publication will allow each edition to be shorter (easier to read) and more timely. It spreads out critical information on state convention and fall board from information on summer retreats and International conventions/conferences.

Fiscal Impact: Savings of approximately \$1,000 in the ASN budget, as printing and mailing costs would be eliminated beginning in the 2019-2020 biennium. The cost to the chapter to make copies for members without email addresses is minimal given that chapters have an Office Depot purchasing card. It would cost less than \$0.50 per copy for each edition of ASN.

Article XIV Amendments Section B Standing Rules

B. Clausen, N Gill Chi (Cowlitz-Wak.)

Line 841 Proposals shall be submitted with a postmark or electronic date no later than December 1st. Any member, committee, board, or chapter may submit proposals to the chair of the Bylaws and Rules Committee on forms provided by the Bylaws and Rules Committee.

Rationale: Currently, there is no deadline for submittal of Standing Rules in the Bylaws. The original intent as stated on the website was Dec.1 to submit to the Bylaws chair. This proposal would make past practice official.

Fiscal Impact: none

Standing Rules Amendment Proposals

3.1 Dues LINE 86

B Clausen, N Gill, Chi (Cowlitz-Wak.)

3.12 State dues shall be active members \$40.00 and reserve members \$15.00. Collegiate members shall not be charged state dues in an effort to support and mentor them.

Rationale: If we are going to encourage women who are currently suffering under the burden of college expenses to join DKG for mentoring, then we should not be adding to their financial burden. This aligns with our DKG purposes and will help us if we build strong collegiate relationships to have them become active members when employed.

Fiscal Impact: Very little at this time as we have very few collegiate members in this new category of membership that just began in 2018.

SR3.12 Line 87-88

B Clausen, N Gill, Chi (Cowlitz-Wak.)

State dues shall be active members \$40.00 and reserve members \$15.00. Beginning in 2013-2019, state dues may must be discussed with the Executive Board and consideration given for regular adjustments once each biennium.

Rationale: The original intent when this Standing Rule was written was that the dues would be considered on a regular basis and raised incrementally over time. This is twice that the permissible language did not work and as a result we have lost members with the high jump in dues.

Fiscal Impact: None

SR3.65 g. 3 Regional** International Conference Finances

Executive Committee

Beginning line # 306 The treasurer and the executive secretary and the state editor or state webmaster shall receive reimbursement for attendance at regional conferences and international conventions.

Rationale: With photographs and articles readily available on the website and through other sources, the presence of the state editor or webmaster is no longer a necessity at international conventions. Special training for editors and webmasters is no longer offered. (*Constitution* Article X Section C Training)

Fiscal Impact: It is recommended to eliminate the funding as per guidelines in SR 3.65b and instead reimburse as a state chair position and reimburse based on travel stipend point values for chairs.

SR3.65 h 4 Travel stipends for international conventions and regional conferences.** Executive Committee

Beginning line # **331**...Officers, (including parliamentarian), membership chair, educational excellence chair, the state newsletter editor or the state webmaster and presenters, Area liaisons, international officers, international committee members and state committee chairs shall receive 1 point.

Rationale: By changing the editor and webmaster to a co-chair committee position, their duties & travel reimbursement will be commensurate with all other state committee chairs for attending state and international conferences and meetings.

Fiscal Impact: It changes the state editor's **or** webmaster's travel/lodging/meal reimbursement to that of a state committee chair, saving hundreds of dollars annually.

the word **regional will be changed to **international** numerous other places in our governing documents to align with guidelines from International.

SR 9.12 Publication Deadlines

Communications Committee

Beginning Line #683 deadlines for submitting articles: October 10, February 10 and June 10 except for EEC, briefed schedule. Effective in the 2019-2021 biennium, deadlines for submitting articles to *The Alpha Sigma News:* October 15, January 15, April 15, and July 15.

deadlines for publication/on-line availability: Nov.10, March 10, July 10. Effective in the 2019-2021 biennium, deadline for online availability of The Alpha Sigma News: November 15, February 15, May 15, and August 15.

Rationale: Electronic publications are easier to read if they have fewer pages, but to get the necessary information currently published requires approximately 50 pages per year. The solution is shorter newsletters published more frequently.

Critical deadlines for publication are for Fall Board and Spring Convention registration, hence the importance of retaining the August and February availability. Adding another edition in May, would allow summer leadership/arts retreat information and regional/international meetings to be sent out in a timely fashion. At this time, they make the Spring issue very lengthy as that edition also has all the budget, nomination, and the proposed rules amendments.

Note: this change will require changes in due dates for nominations, rule changes, and budget deadlines as they would appear one month earlier than the current schedule. For optimal space allocation, it is suggested that nominations might move to the November issue.

Fiscal Impact: No impact if the proposed Bylaws change (Article XI, Section A.1, line 764) is adopted to publish electronically only.
